

Tsnungwe Tribe Connection to the Village of Le:lding

Le:lding means “where the rivers flow together” in Hupa language and is a contraction of Le:-wilin-ding which literally is together – flowing – place. The Hupa speaking bands are the tse:ning-xwe/Tsnungwe (upper Trinity River area), the na:tinixwe (Hoopa Valley area) and the xwiylq’it-xwe/Whilkut (Redwood Creek area). Le:lding is an important village to all 3 of these Hupa-speaking bands because it is the site of many of the pre-human “myth” creation stories. Le:lding was also a village of the k’xinay (pre-human spiritual beings) and the home of yima:n tiwinyay = across the ocean – he went away from us. He is also called yima:n k’iwinxoya:n = across the ocean – old man. Yima:n tiwinyay is considered to be the headman of the k’ixinay and is responsible for many events that shaped our world.

Many things around Le:lding are associated with yima:n tiwinyay. Below is a photo of his house-pit (a depression in ground showing where his house was).



The k'ixinay were immortal spiritual beings. If they became sickly or aged, they would go to Ironside Mountain (tse:ning-ding or tse:nding) and when they descended they would be young again. This allowed the k'ixinay to continue to be immortal. Le:lding is the site of the first death and involves some of yima:n tiwinyay's bad behavior. The world had always been light all the time until this first death. Then, the world had been spoiled by the first death and turned dark all of the time. Yima:n tiwinyay attempted to save and restore the world by racing around the world ten times. Each time he went past Le:lding he would drop a sacred white rock to help keep count. Each round he made around the world, it became gradually lighter. He stopped after five rounds when the world had become half light and half dark, thus creating night and day. Still the world had been spoiled and most of the k'ixinay left to one of the five Hupa heavens. Some became trapped in rocks such as the miy rock at the village of miy-me' at Salyer (near Le:lding). Yima:n tiwinyay was supposed to be the last k'ixinay to leave and he went across the ocean where he is trapped inside of a rock. Before he left, he gave the Hupa people the White Deersin Dance as a lesson in hunting deer and providing for our families. The k'ixinay did this for us so we could take care of ourselves in this world that was still too spoiled for them to remain. There is much more that has been written about all of the pre-human events around Le:lding, but this explains the importance of this village to all Hupa speaking peoples.

In the Indian time pre-contact with whites, Le:lding became the principal and largest village of the Tsnungwe people. South Fork Pole, born at Le:lding about 1810 or 40 years before the Gold Rush, estimated there were 500 Indians at Le:lding, which would make it the largest village of the area by far. All of the versions of the first contact stories with non-Indians involve the village of Le:lding. Most of the Tsnungwe were killed by miners and soldiers or died due to diseases that were introduced by the non-Indians.

All of the Indians above are inter-related. Because of the Tsnungwe marriage patterns, anybody living in the village either had a mother or a father that was originally from Le:lding. If you lived at Le:lding, you could trace an ancestor line back many, many generations through one of the parents (theoretically back to when the k'ixinay left Le:lding for the Indian people). Everybody that lived in the same xontah was very closely related, and everybody in the same village was more distantly related. But of the above, there are two main groups: the Squirrel Tail Tom group and the South Fork Pole group.

The group led by Squirrel Tail Tom included his wife Malinda Kidd, his son Saxey Kidd, his daughter Venus Foote and relative Fanny Lack. The other large group was led by South Fork Pole and included Six Beans, South Fork Sam, father of George South Fork, Mary South Fork Carpenter, South Fork Pete, South Fork John, South Fork George, Webb South Fork and Ike Wells.

The Tsnungwe Indians that remained at Le:lding were removed to the reservation in Hoopa Valley, about 15 miles down the Trinity River. Because the Tsnungwe of Le:lding did not always get along with our neighbors of Hoopa Valley, many chose to live in a separate village while in Hoopa. This village was located at xowung-q'it and was called Kentuck in English.

Most of the above Indians are listed in the earliest censuses of the Kentuck Rancheria on the Hoopa Valley Reservation. Some were able to homestead closer to Le:lding such as Malinda Kidd homesteading at the Kidd-Bussell Ranch in Willow Creek and Venus Foote homesteading at the Foote Ranch in China Flat/Willow Creek. Mary South Fork Carpenter was also living in the South Fork of the Trinity River and Willow Creek areas then. Squirrel Tail Tom was no longer alive, killed during the Indian wars and years of conflict. Fanny Lack had also moved back to the South Fork of the Trinity River and Willow Creek areas. South Fork Pete most likely lived at Kentuck when taken to Hoopa, but later married his wife from tiyshta:ngah-ding (Tish Tang) and moved there with her.

During the fighting with miners and soldiers and years of conflict, Malinda Kidd, Saxey Kidd and family were taken to Hoopa from the New River area where they had been hiding in caves. The first available census in Hoopa is 1860 and Malinda is listed with James Kidd (white) who had taken her as a wife. Saxey was listed as Saxey Kentuck, indicating the Malinda and Saxey were living at Kentuck with the other Le:lding Indians when she got together with James Kidd.

Even though the information on these censuses is inconsistent (names change, spelling change, ages change, relationships change), there is some truth in all of this and the most important fact is that this village was dominated by Tsnungwe Indians, mainly from the village of Le:lding or very close to it.

The information from the 1888 Census is similar. It is the last year that Hoopa Reservation censuses were broken down by village. It is also very likely that even though the families were listed at the Kentuck Rancheria on the Hoopa Reservation, many were already going back and forth to the Willow Creek/Le:ldin/Salyer area.

By the 1880s, some Tsnungwe from Le:lding had already returned to the Willow Creek/Le:lding/Salyer areas as mentioned before. Some were in the process of returning to our homeland. And some chose to stay in Hoopa, either at the Kentuck Ranch or other villages where they were related by blood or marriage. Examples of this would be the South Fork Pete family at Tish Tang Rancheria, the Dr. Tom family at Tish Tang Rancheria, and some of the South Fork George family at Socktish Rancheria. Mary South Fork Carpenter and her daughter Elizabeth Carpenter Beebe were living back in our homeland in

the South Fork of the Trinity and Willow Creek areas, but still maintained ties with their South Fork George relatives at Socktish.

Elizabeth Carpenter Beebe's family has always maintained a connection to the Socktish Rancheria in Hoopa Valley. George Southfork was Mary Southfork Carpenter's brother. George Southfork was first married to Kitty Fork, who was from Socktish. They had a child Norman Socktish. Kitty died a day after Norman was born. While George was staying at the Kentuck Rancheria with all the Le:lding survivors, Norman was being raised in Socktish. Inez Socktish mentioned in the **Elizabeth Carpenter Beebe** information above was Norman's daughter and George Southfork's grand-daughter.

Another interesting connection is that George Southfork later had another wife from Socktish named Nettie Duskey (Southfork George) (Kentuck). Nettie had some children with George Southfork and this marriage apparently ended and she returned to Socktish. The same Nettie would later marry Kentuck or William Kentuck Sr. and have another child with him named Peter Kentuck. During the 1928 Applications for Indians of California, Peter Kentuck was in an Insane Asylum in South Dakota and his application was completed by his cousin John Carpenter, Elizabeth Carpenter Beebe's brother.

This connection was also shown in the Peter Kentuck obituary information in Phyllis Dartt Jurin's notebook. It shows Peter Kentuck died Sept. 20, 1977. His parents were William Kentuck (1844-1911) and Nettie (1858-1912). It refers to Nettie as Nettie Southfork George. Then it lists brother and sisters to Peter Kentuck as: Ajax George, Joe George, and Paul George. It also lists Nettie's parents as Old Duskey (1819-1895) and Sophia Duskey (1827-1895). This information is supported by the 1886 census at the Socktish Rancheria. This information shows Nettie with her parents and with her children Ajax George, Joe George, and Andy is apparently Paul George. These are all children of South Fork George.

Many documents are census records link these families together and show their connection to Le:lding. Le:ldin is also important in that it was one of the named villages in the 1851 Treaty of Lower Klamath. In this treaty it is referred to by the Yurok name of Wish-pooke and spelling variations which refers to the forks of the river.
